3. **Work crew:** Gain work experience on one of 60 crews including Dining, Landscaping, Communications, Craft, or IT crews.
4. **Senior Capstone:** Conduct undergraduate research, extensive fieldwork, or a culminating creative project.
5. **Project-based learning:** Benefit from experiential course design throughout every major.

Hands-on experience with basic vet procedures such as pregnancy checks, vaccinations, pulling animals during birth, sutures, hoof treatments, and treating bloat are very rare at the undergraduate level — but not at Warren Wilson!

Where nature and culture *merge*.



Our campus teems with life: our mountains hold more types of plants than any other area in North America and more salamander species than any other place *in the world*. And there are more to find.

Students working with Dr. Paul Bartels recently discovered a new tardigrade species on campus and named it *Milnesium warrenwilsonensis*. Commonly known as “water bears,” these microscopic creatures are famous for being able to survive nearly anything — including the vacuum of space.

With farm, forests, mountains, and the Swannanoa River on campus and the vibrant city of **Asheville** right next door, your classrooms are not limited to those with walls.

You can learn sustainable agriculture on our student-run farm and garden. Discuss history in a landscape drenched in it. Create within this stunning setting — compose music or poetry, paint, blacksmith, weave, or sculpt.

We have committed 600 of our 1,000+ acres of farm and forest land to **permanent conservancy**.

The national leader for learning in *action*.

Active learning deepens understanding and knowledge retention for all types of learners. And our faculty are experts at designing experiential courses that engage and inspire.

Hands-on learning across campus and around the world:

- ◇ Environmental Science students in Dr. Alisa Hove's courses track plant growth in phenology gardens on campus, contributing to global data on the impact of climate change.
- ◇ Student writers, artists, and musicians inspire action working with local trans, nonbinary, queer, and femme youth to create empowering films in Professor Charlotte Taylor's *Take Back the Screen* course.
- ◇ Dr. Sarah Himmelheber and her Social Work students explore the practice of "green care" — the therapeutic benefits of nature — while growing plants with veterans.
- ◇ Students in our *Theories and Techniques in Counseling* and *Psychotherapy* course partner with a local nursing facility to practice counseling skills used in psychotherapy alongside professional mentors.
- ◇ International & Social Justice Studies students have rural village homestays in Indonesia with Dr. Siti Kusujarti, doing field research and community development projects.

Supporting *all kinds of minds*.

Neurotypical and neurodivergent students thrive here. We embrace the neurocomplexity in each of us. Our services for learners who seek extra support — be that with learning disabilities, executive functioning, mental health, academic and writing skills, or social belonging — are exceptionally strong. All support services and neurocomplexity programs are non-diagnostic, meaning they don't carry labels and are open to any student seeking extra support.

Capstone: *research & create*.

You'll complete a **Senior Capstone Project**, some of which lead to graduate-level publications and awards.



For her Environmental Studies Capstone, **Madison Sings (she/her)** partnered with the town of Black Mountain, NC, to introduce a stormwater utility fee credit for residents who add green infrastructure on their properties.



Sociology & Anthropology major **Benjamin Airing (they/them)** studied the retail store Hot Topic as a site where White racial identity and subcultural identities merge or interact.



Creative Writing major and Music minor **Ruben Cardenas (he/him)** wrote a novel set in the 1700s for his Capstone. He read an excerpt at the Senior Reading and also performed for a Senior Music Recital.

Study *abroad*.

Opportunities range from a few weeks to a year with **more than 200 programs to choose from**. Our students have spent semesters and full years studying on every continent. We also have short-term faculty-led Study Abroad courses to dozens of countries including Ghana, Indonesia, Cuba, Ireland, Greece, Costa Rica, and more.

You'll work at least ten hours a week on your campus work crew and **earn \$3,000 or more toward the cost of tuition every year.**

Some students turn their commitment to service and social action into a career working for — or even founding — nonprofits after graduation. Environmental Science major **Chloë Moore (he/she)** landed a job as Farm Manager at Southside Community Garden, a Black-led urban farm in Asheville's historically Black Southside neighborhood. He also co-founded the nonprofit Liberation Tools.

Engage in community.

In addition to community-engaged courses, you may serve in other ways:

Community partners: Form ongoing relationships with one or more of 50 community partners addressing five main issues areas: Environment, Housing & Houselessness, Race & Immigration, Youth & Education, and Food Security.

Lightning Term break trips: These seven-week experiential courses culminate in a week of immersive travel over a break. Engage directly with communities through hands-on service and reflection. Recent experiences included partnering with a grassroots nonprofit in the Gullah Geechee community of coastal South Carolina and post-flood restoration work in rural Kentucky.

Internships: Combine service with an internship by helping sea turtle hatchlings in Florida reach the ocean with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service or connecting with children in the foster care system here in Asheville.

Activism: Recently, students have lobbied for climate action in Washington, DC, and worked with the local Racial Justice Coalition.

Upon graduation, he was hired by NASA to join a team programming a new tool that uses daily satellite data to measure snow melt in Alaska in order to identify areas of heightened wildfire risk.
